What you will all study in Years 10 and 11




- Everyone will study English Language & Literature,
 Maths, Statistics, and Science
- Everyone will take PE and PSD
- You will all be able to choose 3
 other subjects to study
- Most students will gain 9 qualifications, or 10 if taking Triple Science

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Everyone will study Maths in Y10 & Y11

You will all take **two** GCSEs

GCSE Statistics in Y10
GCSE Maths in Y11

All students will study English.

You will take **two** GCSEs

English Language and **English Literature**, both taken in Y11

All students will study GCSE Science.

You will take **two** or **three** Science GCSEs

Decision depends on Y9 attainment and is separate to Options

What students can choose to study in Years 10 and 11

- Students will all study 3
 other subjects in Years 10 & 11
- Students will need to choose 3 subjects to study plus
 2 reserves in case they cannot study your chosen 3

Some Information about Choices

Not all subjects offered may run.

This will depend on for, example, how many students choose each subject.

Students cannot choose more than one of:

- Art or Textiles
- Physical Education (PE) or Sports Studies in their choices.



Technical Awards

We offer courses which are Technical Awards

They have the same value as GCSEs but are not called GCSEs.

These courses are:

- Btec in Performing Arts (Dance)
- OCR National Child Development and Care
- OCR National Sport Studies





The English Baccalaureate (E-bacc)

The English Baccalaureate (E-bacc) is made up of English Language and English Literature, Maths, Science, plus

At least one of History or Geography

AND

A language (e.g. French or Spanish)

Computer Science is also an E-bacc subject, and counts as a science.

All students are able to choose subjects that make up the English Baccalaureate, and are encouraged to do so.

The English Baccalaureate (E-bacc)

Choosing the E-bacc at GCSE gives students

- access to a full range of employment options and
- the broad knowledge that employers, 6th forms and universities are looking for when they leave secondary school
- Universities may look at Ebac GCSEs when making a decision about applications – especially for competitive subjects or universities.
- Many of the top Russell Group of Universities—such as Oxford, Cambridge, Bristol, Exeter, Birmingham and Warwick look more favourably at students with the EBacc.
- It helps keep all options open

All students are encouraged to choose subjects to make up the Ebac

Choosing at least one E-Bacc subject is strongly recommended

Child Development

NCFE award, not a GCSE

Very valuable qualification for all students

Suitable for students who

- know they want a career in child care e.g. working in a nursery and
- know they want to study child care immediately after leaving Barnwood Park.

It is not accepted by all 6th forms or universities

Business Studies

- Is a GCSE, not a technical award
- Includes a lot of maths
- Involves learning a lot of new terminologies
- Is assessed by two 90 minute written exams (with calculators)
- Is *not* needed to study Business at 6th form or college or university

Important questions for students to ask themselves

What do I want to be doing in 10 years time?

in 5 years time?

in 2 years time?

- What do I need to study now to achieve my goals?
- What subjects will help me keep my future options open?
- What subjects do I enjoy and want to learn more about?
- What are my strengths and skills now? What do they need to be?
- What type of learner am I?
- Where can I find out the information that I need?
- What subjects if I don't choose will I find it hard to return to in the future?

What subjects if I don't choose will it be *harder* to return to do in the future?

Dos and Don'ts for students

DO



DON'T



- Ask questions
- Listen to what you hear be open minded
- Do some research find out about subjects careers or courses prefer.
- Be honest with yourself about who you are and what you want to do
- Go with subjects that make your heart sing!

- Choose what your *friends* choose.
 You are not them. You are you.
- Choose a subject based on a teacher. They may not be teaching you next year.
- Be afraid. Difficult decisions are part of life and lots of people are here to help
- Choose subjects to please others.
 Your future, your choice, your responsibility

Indicative Choices—next week

You do not need to stick with your indicative choice, it is just an indicator to help *plan* to deliver the options you want.

For example they indicate:

- how many students may want to choose each subject,
- how many groups we might need in each subject,
- what combinations of subjects are popular, and
- what subjects don't have many people choosing them

Indicative choices are shared with subject leaders who will raise any concerns about choices before Student Options Meetings



What if students change their mind?

- We want students to be happy
- See me to complete an Option
 Change Form and have parent/carer
 and teacher approval
- Allowed for the first 3 weeks of Y10

BUT students may not be able to change because:

- Subjects are full
- Subjects are on at the same time



Advice from Year 10 & 11...

"Year 10 isn't easy and you will have to work hard: don't pick what your friends have done because you will not enjoy your subjects"

"Think about what you would like to do when you are older and which options will be relevant and helpful for doing that."

"Don't choose your subjects because of what your friends are choosing because you 100% want to do it."

"Choose options that you'll be interested to learn, that you'll be sad to not study any more. This is your decision, so make sure you make the right choices for you."

More advice from Year 10 & 11...

"You really need to think about what YOU want to take as it's going to be for two years."

If you know what you want to do choose options that are relevant to what you want to do as a job.
However, be careful as you may change your mind!

"Choose subjects that you enjoy learning about. Don't choose what your friends are choosing as you will sit the exam alone."

"Be aware of which subjects will require a lot of your time outside of class – art and dance have been big time commitments."

"Do pick things you will ENJOY!
Don't choose something you know you won't enjoy,
it's two years of your life."
