Don't worry if your birthday falls on a weekend or during a holiday period, as you can still come to the library before or after your special occasion to design your bookmark!






BOOK SWAP:










NATIONAL POETRY DAY

FABULOUS LIBRARIES FROM AROUND THE WORLD: THE BODLEIAN LIBRARIES



The Bodleian Library in Oxford was founded by Sir Thomas Bodley and officially opened in 1602. Since then, the Bodleian Libraries group has grown to be the largest academic library system in the UK. In its reading rooms, generations of famous scholars have studied through the ages, amongst them monarchs, Nobel Prize winners, British Prime Ministers and writers including Oscar Wilde, C S Lewis and J R R Tolkien.

The Bodleian Library is the second-largest library in Britain after the British Library.

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THE CHELTENHAM LITERATURE FESTIVAL











On Thursday 12th October, we (Mrs Scanlan and Mrs Beale) took a group of seven Y7 students to the Cheltenham Literature Festival. The students observed two author events. Firstly, they attended a talk by Carnegie medal-winning author Tanya Landman about gothic traditions, with tips and tools for creating their own gothic stories. They then watched a talk by Julian Sedgwick (author of Tsunami Girl) and his illustrator Chie Kutsuwada, with a live manga art demonstration included.

Marielle and Ruby asked Tanya Landman a question each:

Marielle – "Which is your favourite book that you have written?"

Tanya Landman responded that they are all her favourites, but she tends to like the most recent one she has written.

Ruby – "With Frankenstein, did you alter his ego?"

Tanya Landman replied that she didn't change his ego.

Tanya spoke a little about Frankenstein and other gothic greats. This book was written when Mary Shelley was 19. Tanya Landman has subsequently rewritten some of the gothic books to include Frankenstein. She removed the long descriptions and adapted the book to make it more accessible to readers under the Barrington Stoke (see next page) umbrella.

After Tanya Landman's talk, the students experienced a joint presentation from Julian Sedgwick and his illustrator, Chie Kutsuwada, where they introduced their new collaboration, 100 Tales from the Tokyo Ghost Café. The students learnt a little about Japanese culture and ghost stories. Although the latest book hasn't yet been published, we were lucky enough to each receive a book sample. Look out for the book, which is expected to be published in November 2023!

During the book signing by Julian Sedgwick and Chie Kutsuwada, Marielle asked Julian, "Did you tell ghost stories when you were young?".

He responded that he didn't as he was scared.
