
Reading Challenge

Well done to all those students who have taken part in the challenge to read 25 of our library books by the end of the school year. Over 40 students have read 10 or more books, with 17 having read 25 books and 8 having gone on to complete the extension of reading 50 in total. **The 8 students who have achieved this are Lisa (Y11), Reuben (Y7), Jonas (Y10), Daisy (Y9), Kamsiy (Y10), Arunima (Y8), Kaima (Y9) and Jorja (Y8).** In addition, Lisa has gone on to read a further 25 books and therefore 75 books in total. This is a fantastic achievement, particularly as she was also studying for her GCSEs. It is great to see students from all year groups participating.

On completion of the challenge, students received an achievement badge (designed by one of our students) and a certificate, as well as 25 house points. By completing the extension, students received a further 25 house points and a Reading Champion badge.

The Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing



The Yoto Carnegie Awards are the UK's longest running children's book awards, recognising outstanding reading experiences created through writing and illustration in books for children and young people.

In recent years, we have taken part in the Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing as one of the shadowing groups, and this year was no exception.

We signed up under the name of Barnwood Bookworms and set about reading the seven shortlisted books with our book groups. Once every book was read, we voted for our favourite with **The Light in Everything by Katya Balen** being our winner. The medal winner, as judged solely by librarians was **The Blue Book of Nebo**, and the overall shadowing groups' favourite differed from ours, with **I Must Betray You** coming out on top.

FABULOUS LIBRARIES FROM AROUND THE WORLD: THE SEATTLE CENTRAL LIBRARY

There are 27 branches of the Seattle Public Library system. The Seattle Central Library is the flagship (see definition) and opened on 23rd May 2004. The 11floor building contains an innovative "Books Spiral", a 275seat auditorium and open spaces where patrons can meet, study, search the web or read. The Library has centres for children, teens and adult readers, along with expanded collections and a large computer lab. It has the capacity to hold about one and a half million books and other materials. The library also has underground parking for about 143 vehicles.
