Graphic Novel - Nightmare of the Scarecrows by Ian MacDonald (author) and Mark Penman (illustrator)


The book is very good and scary. My favourite part is when it gets *really* scary!

## **The Book Thief**


Author: Markus Zusak

Recommended for: We would recommend this book to any years who are up to the challenge of reading this.






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

Review: A good read if you want to widen your vocabulary, but it takes a While to read, so be prepared for a challenge.


Recommended for: Year 10s and 11s - as the vocabulary is advanced and tricky to understand

#### Starfield Library in Seoul, South Korea

Sitting inside one of the world's largest underground shopping malls, the Starfield Library houses approximately 50,000 books of various genres. The library is an open public space where anyone can freely come to sit down, take a break and immerse themselves in books along with other bibliophiles (see definition). Each month, the library hosts a range of events from author lectures to art exhibitions.


